OPERATING LEVY 3.0 MILLS

Operating existing twenty-seven buildings. Operate three new elementary schools, one new middle school, and one new high school.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT 1.25 MILLS

Dedicated funds to repair and maintain buildings. Provide updated technology to prepare students for the future.

BOND NO ADDITIONAL MILLAGE

The bond issue will be on the ballot for 2.72 mills. However, the district expects NO tax rate increase from the bond.

FUNDING MYTHS AND FACTS

Myth: The recent increase in state formula funding should cover Olentangy's needs.

Fact: After years of advocacy by the district and community, Olentangy's state formula funding increased from years past which reduced the levy ask. However, this does not eliminate the need for a levy entirely as the district makes plans to accommodate current and projected growth.

Myth: The taxes from new homes will pay for the enrollment growth.

Fact: Taxes from new home construction do not cover the cost of building new schools, and in many cases, don't even cover the cost to educate additional students. Here's a simplified example:





property taxes to Olentangy Schools



cost per student \$13,735



Approx. 32 years for this house to pay for 1 student's K-12 education

A Myth: The taxes from the recent Delaware County reappraisal will pay for the enrollment growth.

Fact: According to OLSD Treasurer Ryan Jenkins, "Due to Ohio law, the tax increase associated with property reappraisals is not equal to the increase in property value. The average increase in property valuations in 2023 is 34%, but a homeowner with a valuation increase of 34% will see taxes paid to Olentangy Schools increase by 4.73%."
